My Fellow Brother Knights! As I reflect on the beginning of the holiday season (Halloween, Thanksgiving and Christmas) and the council events that we conduct to support those holidays, I'm amazed and very thankful for all the support we receive as well as can give.

For Halloween, the council volunteered to grill hotdogs and serve food and beverages during the PTO Trunk or Treat event for the St. Pius School children. We are attempting to relieve the parents from having to volunteer to serve the food and beverages so that they can be with their children trunk or treating or passing out candy.

We also are supporting our local kids in need with the Coats for Kids program that was kicked off in the beginning of October. We've raised more than \$3,500 so far and have distributed more than 160 coats to needs kids during our first distribution at St. Andre Bessette in Ecorse on October 8, 2023. In addition to 12 knights from our council volunteered as well as 8 SPX Eighth Graders who also volunteered. We have another distribution scheduled November 11, 2023, at St. Andre Bessette. All are welcome to volunteer. It is difficult for me to describe the good feeling you get when putting a new coat on a needy child.

One story that is unique that I experienced during this year's CFK campaign was that I received a note from a grandmother. She had called Lou, the parish secretary stating that her grandson desperately needed a winter coat this year and some shoes but did not have any transportation to St. Andre Bessette. Coincidently, I had just finished cleaning out my basement and I was about to donate my son's shoes and boots he no longer wore (as he outgrew them) to the Salvation Army. So, I took it upon myself to get a new coat from the CFK program as well as a new hat and gloves and my son's sneakers and winter boots and delivered it to her. Upon receiving those items, the grandmother was so truly thankful that she was crying. Her grandson was so happy to receive the new coat, gloves, hat, boots and shoes. Especially shoes. He showed me his only pair of old shoes that were on canvas and had holes in them. He was literally running around jumping for joy.

As I reflect on why I joined the council and volunteered to lead the council, it is unique events like the one I just shared that gives reason to the purpose. Which is to help, to give back, to teach, to set the example and to be a force for good. This is essence of being a Catholic and a Knight. Come join us!

RECENT REFLECTION OF GOSPEL MESSAGE FROM FR. SURESH

Twenty fifth Sunday of the Year: Is 55: 6-9; Phil 1: 20c-24, 27a; Mt 20:1-16a.

Anecdotes

1: "That's not fair!" How many times, in the course of a given day, have you heard someone protest, "That's not fair!" Children on a playground shout when they detect a foul play: "That's not fair!" Siblings doing household chores may complain, "I'm doing more work!" or "My chores are more difficult; that's not fair!" Students at school may resent the extra attention given to a classmate... "She's the teacher's favorite; that's not fair!" A brother thinks his piece of pie appears to be smaller than his sister's -- "That's not fair!" Someone at work receives a raise in salary when another person thinks he/she is more deserving: "I have seniority. I've been here longer; that's not fair!" The coach of the Little League baseball team always puts her child in as starting pitcher; other players are annoyed... "That's not fair!" Most of us think that good work, seniority and experience should be rewarded, that all should be subject to the same rules, like "First come, first served," that everyone should be treated impartially and that there should be no exceptions and no favorites! Therefore, when confronted with a situation such as that put before us in today's Gospel parable of identical wages for different numbers of hours of work, our sense of fairness in provoked. The prophet Isaiah reminds the exiles in Babylon that their God is more merciful than they are, and more forgiving. He is ready to pardon their infidelity which has resulted in their exile. Their merciful God will bless them with material and spiritual blessings.

Isaiah reminds us that the God of Moses and the prophets doesn't think in the same way that we do. God is more merciful than we are, and more forgiving. As Isaiah reports, "My thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways My ways, says the Lord." Perhaps we would have a better world if we were to adopt some of God's ways instead of asking questions? Our faith teaches us that, as a loving Father, God acts only for our good. God is always near to us in this life, and if we remain near to Him on this earth, we can trust in His love and goodness to keep us near Him forever in Heaven.

We do not always understand God's ways, and that is why it is dangerous to complain. Complaining takes place in today's Gospel. Those who were hired first complain because those who worked only one hour received the same wage as they did. We certainly understand their feelings. We probably would have the same reaction, if we were in their shoes. This parable is one of the most difficult parables for us to understand. But, before we become too critical, we must realize that all the parable is doing is reflecting life as it is.

The truth is that life is unfair. We would like to think that those who work the hardest would be the most successful. But we all know people who are working two, maybe three, jobs and are still unable to support their families. We would like to think that the people who have the most talent are those would be the most respected and compensated.

But we all know of football players who cannot even remember to keep their helmets on their heads (sorry about this) who are making millions of dollars more than teachers who give their life instructing our young. We would like to think that people who are good and who live honestly are going to have easier lives. But we all know people who are the "salt of the earth" who have terrible crosses to bear. And each time we see any of these inequalities, we are tempted to complain.

Life does not always fall into categories that we think are just. In an unfair world, jealousy can consume us. If we compare ourselves to others, that comparison can make us blind to the blessings that we have received. The gospel reminds us that our blessings are real, and it is only by embracing them that we will be able to find happiness regardless of how much more others seem to be given.

"Take what belongs to you and go." Live the life you have been given, not the life that you wish you had been given, not the life that other people have been given. Live your life fully because complaining will only diminish you, only lessen you.

So, what is it you complain about? Your spouse? Your children? Your parents? Your job? Your retirement? Your church? Your government? Your health? Be careful about complaining because it can rob you of life. Instead, take what belongs to you and go. If you don't like something change it. If you can't change it then change the way you think about it. But don't waste your time complaining. Life is simply too short for that.

The good news is this: life may be unfair, but God is in charge. And God will not forget any of us.
